# Matthew 20:1-16

"For the kingdom of heaven is like a master of a house who went out early in the morning (6am) to hire laborers for his vineyard.<sup>2</sup> After agreeing with the laborers for a denarius a day, he sent them into his vineyard.<sup>3</sup> And going out about the third hour (9am) he saw others standing idle in the marketplace, <sup>4</sup> and to them he said, 'You go into the vineyard too, and whatever is right I will give you.' <sup>5</sup> So they went. Going out again about the sixth hour (noon) and the ninth hour (3pm) he did the same. <sup>6</sup> And about the eleventh hour (5pm) he went out and found others standing. And he said to them, 'Why do you stand here idle all day?' <sup>7</sup> They said to him, 'Because no one has hired us.' He said to them, 'You go into the vineyard too.' <sup>8</sup> And when evening came (6pm), the owner of the vineyard said to his foreman, 'Call the laborers and pay them their wages, beginning with the last, up to the first.' <sup>9</sup> And when those hired about the eleventh hour came, each of them received a denarius. <sup>10</sup> Now when those hired first came, they thought they would receive more, but each of them also received a denarius.

<sup>11</sup> And on receiving it they grumbled at the master of the house, <sup>12</sup> saying, 'These last worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us who have borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat.' <sup>13</sup> But he replied to one of them, 'Friend, I am doing you no wrong. Did you not agree with me for a denarius? <sup>14</sup> Take what belongs to you and go. I choose to give to this last worker as I give to you. <sup>15</sup> Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or do you begrudge my generosity?' <sup>16</sup> So the last will be first, and the first last."

I have given you my whole life. I didn't do all those 'fun' things but served you all these years! I wish I would have sowed my "wild oats" first instead of "wasting" my good years.



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
### **Late Workers**

# A First/Last Savior

## Philippians 2:5-11

Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, <sup>6</sup> who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, <sup>7</sup> but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. <sup>8</sup> And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. <sup>9</sup> Therefore God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above every name, <sup>10</sup> so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, <sup>11</sup> and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

# A First/Last Savior

#### Philippians 3:7-9

But whatever gain I had, I counted as loss for the sake of Christ. <sup>8</sup> Indeed, I count everything as loss because of the surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things and count them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ <sup>9</sup> and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but that which comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God that depends on faith

# First/Last Servants

### **To Believe**

John 6:28-29 Then they said to him, "What must we do, to be doing the works of God?" <sup>29</sup> Jesus answered them, "This is the work of God, that you believe in him whom he has sent."

### To Love

Luke 10:27-28 "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself." <sup>28</sup> And he said to him, "You have answered correctly; do this, and you will live."

You are valued by The Master and your work matters, but your work doesn't elevate and entitle you

### The Gospel for the Late workers

- Come to the field! The Master is calling us to join together to His work and to his eternal reward, which is Him, not just what he can give you.
- Learn from those who have been in the field longer; and humbly teach them as well.

#### The Gospel for the Early Workers

- Salvation is not a zero-sum game; others' being blessed does not detract from your inheritance.
  - Rejoice that there are more brothers and sisters joining in glory.
- Rejoice that our Heavenly Father is ridiculously generous (or else we all would be bankrupt).
